# **Mission Statement**

membership of 911 people living with HIV, which is a 10.5% increase on 2008 with a total of 9,540 member visits throughout the year. Open Heart House challenges social isolation of HIV and AIDS through peer support. While we can argue that the medical management of HIV has improved that HIV continues to be highly stigmatised by taboos, moral judgments, misinformation and blame. Our 911 members continue to live the daily challenge of such judgments and attitudes, which seriously impede each person's self confidence, self esteem and overall quality of life. Throughout the year, our members experienced varying degrees of HIV-related stigma, lack of knowledge and awareness of how HIV can and, most important, how HIV cannot be transmitted. Those were some of the real issues that our members lived with and continue to live with on a daily basis and which continued to be the central aspect of the work of the Membership Department and its respective teams through 2009.

So while we can celebrate momentarily for reaching a particular strategic target; we will never truly celebrate until such time as when our members are viewed and accepted as equal participating members in mainstream society. It was with this continuing belief and conviction that we worked closely with our members and continued to provide an environment of warmth, welcome and acceptance throughout 2009.

### **The Membership Team**

#### **Membership Support Volunteers**

Membership Support Volunteers continued to provide much needed support throughout the year. The Support Volunteer Team consisted of: Agota Vida, Toni Kavanagh, Shylet Mateu, Mary Brennan, Siobhan Corcoran and Louise Byrne.

#### **The Gay Tuesday Club**

The Gay Tuesday Club, which is now the longest and only HIV+ club in Ireland continued to meet monthy. The club continued to be self run by the Membership and facilitated a safe space for many lesbian, gay, bisexual, and

### Specialised Spaces The Reid Ladies Club

The Reid Ladies Club met twice monthly in 2009 and commenced the year by drawing up an operational plan that would support and address the needs of the women. The group, met a total of twenty times in 2009. They addressed their needs under the headings of: Social – Spiritual – Emotional – Mental – and Physical. transgendered (LGBT) members to meet in a safe and social environment over a relaxed dinner and reap the benefits of peer support and advice on issues specific to the HIV+ LGBT community.

# The Open Heart House Outreach programme

The Open Heart House Outreach programme provides an invaluable support to our members who for various reasons are unable to return to the centre on a daily or weekly basis. The Open Heart House Outreach Programmme reaches those members who are often most marginalised within society.

Our Outreach worker supports members who have difficulties in their lives, such as homelessness. mental health issues, addiction issues, including risk and harm reduction support. Support is also extended to those members within the refugee and asylum-seeking process. Other supports include the need for compliance with HIV medication, and for those who have a dual diagnosis of Hepatitis C (Hep C) and HIV and who may be still involved in drug misuse. Particular support is given on how to manage active addiction while maintaining compliance with HIV and Hep C combination treatment.

A key focus of the support programme is to encourage members to avail of, not only the services offered by Open Heart House but all other statutory and voluntary agencies.

During 2009 our Outreach Worker made in excess of 200 interventions during street outreach, which

included Dublin 1, 2, 3 and 4 areas plus Dublin 8, 10, 12, and 24 areas. A further 125 interventions were made by visiting members at St James's Hospital, the Mater Hospital and the respite unit at Cherry Orchard Hospital.

### Counselling & Psychotherapy Programme

The Psychotherapy and Counselling service is a vital service which aids and supports our members who are looking for support, advice and inner direction for what life may be throwing at them or has thrown at them before.

2009 saw the Psychotherapy team increase its numbers from five therapists to seven. The variety of skills at Open Heart House's disposal are shown within the training and disciplines practiced by our excellent team of Psychotherapists. Open Heart House provided a service whereby throughout our opening times (other than Sundays) the counselling service was available through appointment for our members. The waiting list time for members seeking counselling was on average down to a maximum of two weeks. This is an excellent development as it

has meant that if a member was in need of intervention through counselling support the member would not have long to wait at all. Overall in 2009 the psychotherapy team conducted over 650 counselling sessions.

The reasons for people attending counselling are wide and hugely varied as individual as the people themselves attending. To name a few reasons for a person seeking counselling would be issues such as disclosure, HIV, issues around relationships and family, depression and addiction; and in all these areas our Psychotherapy team were able to provide much needed support.

Once again I would like to thank all our psychotherapists and counsellors as they all give their time voluntarily and without them Open Heart House would be a much poorer service provider indeed.

### Membership as a national network of People Living with HIV and AIDS

With a current membership of 911 members accessing various forms of support from Open Heart House, and the knowledge that each member knows at least one other person living with HIV, we have achieved involving approximately 30% of the Irish HIV+ community in a national network of People Living with HIV and AIDS. Particular areas in which this

network is strongest are:

- Southwest region through our members' involvement in the Positive – Positive Support group in Cork and other social networks in the region.
- Galway and the Western region
- South East region, particularly Waterford
- Midlands region, particularly Portlaoise
- Dublin and specific areas in the region

### **Members as Leaders**

A number of our members continued to show strong leadership throughout 2009. We acknowledge and congratulate Jimmy Goulding for successfully taking a case through the Equality Tribunal, the result of which will see the law being changed so as people living with HIV or AIDS cannot be discriminated on the grounds of an HIV+ diagnosis. Joe Lynch and Sergio Moura spoke and highlighted the lack of awareness of HIV through different media through the year.

Our members continued to play their part in

addressing the health needs of people living with HIV and AIDS. Some worked at Government level on the National AIDS Strategy Committee's with a particular focus on the care and management of People living with HIV and AIDS. Others joined the Gay Heath Network and many were centrally involved in producing the Networks newest publication: 'Living with HIV+ Sex'. Our members continued to work as part of HIV Services Network and the Stamp out Stigma sub-group throughout the year.

#### Collaboration

In line with our Mission Statement we actively continued to nurture current partnerships with a range of semi-state and community, business, religious, voluntary organisations nationally in achieving our common purpose to confront the social reality of HIV and AIDS. This spirit of partnership was very much in evidence at the 2009 Nordic Conference in Dublin, which brings together all the agencies working on behalf of the HIV+ community in Ireland as well as several others from northern Europe.

Our Service Range

The range of services provided by Open Heart House is designed to facilitate peer support, encourage healthier nutritional practices, combat isolation and to facilitate the growth and personal development of our members on their life journey. Feeling isolated can be a source of great distress, so finding ways of interacting with other people that are safe, confidential, accepting and welcoming is important to the emotional wellbeing of many. Through our Education Programmes and Personal Growth and Wellness Programmes we aim to engage our members towards a better life-style and behavioral changes to optimize health and wellbeing.

We encourage our members to engage in educative, cultural, spiritual and relaxation activities which can help promote better self-esteem, raise confidence and progress through the challenges of life. These interventions can be important sources of comfort and stimulation whilst all of the time supporting our members to taking small and measurable

#### **Meals Programme**

From Monday through to Thursday, and also on Sunday, our chef provided three course meals using fresh ingredients, conscious of nutrition. Members are provided with homemade soup, savoury traditional main courses and deserts in the dining room and homemade brown bread and scones in the coffee dock. In this way, our members also have an opportunity to spend time together in a warm and safe atmosphere.

### **Clothing Bank**

In 2008 we opened our own clothes and household goods bank within the project. 24% of our members are homeless or are living in temporary accommodation. We have found over the last number of years this presented our members with basic life challenges such as sourcing clothes or shoes. With the kind help of donations from friends of Open Heart House, we can now provide clean clothes, shoes and household goods.

#### **Fitness Studio**

Fat distribution alterations and lipodystrophy (the accumulation of fat including both fat gain and fat loss as a result of taking older anti-HIV drugs) occur as part of a broad spectrum of body changes in people who live with HIV/AIDS. We provide a fully equipped gymnasium to assist our members to combat these physical challenges. Each year we source a volunteer fitness instructor who will design a fitness programme tailored to our members individual needs and ability. This year we created a women's gym space to facilitate the specific needs of our female members.

#### **Arts & Crafts**

In 2009 our Arts & Crafts class group took part in many projects within Open Heart House under the direction of our art tutor Liz Walsh. Liz joined us on a student placement programme from the National College of Art & Design. On completion of her placement, Liz who struck up a genuine bond We hope to encourage our members to explore their artistic creativity while also learning how to work with a variety of arts and crafts mediums.

#### **Internet Service**

In an effort to help our members to combat the isolation of living with HIV/AIDS we provide a public internet service which enables them to keep in touch with friends and family all around the globe. It is also a facility whereby our members can access information on all aspects of HIV/AIDS, treatment, medication, side effects and self-care.

with our members very kindly came on board as a volunteer arts and crafts tutor. Adults and children produced cards, paintings, ceramic hearts for valentines day and posters. They also took part in crochet and sewing classes and a range of other creative activities.

### Education and Training Adult Literacy Tutor Training

We were delighted to work with the City of Dublin Vocational Educational Committee (CDVEC) who placed an Adult Literacy Tutor Trainer with us to train 12 of our members and one volunteer

to become Literacy Trainers. We wish to thank the CDVEC and its exceptional staff for their unending support and advice throughout the year. Through work like this we endeavour to confer a sense of empowerment and a belief that each individual can make a difference not only to their own lives but to others also.

### **One-to-One Literacy Tuition**

It was discovered last year that a significant number of our members had left school without having completed primary education. Thanks to the superbly skilled Literacy Tutors from the CDVEC, at present three of our members are attending one-to-one literacy training here at Open Heart House.

HIV/AIDS Information and Awareness Course

Each year Open Heart House hosts a HIV/AIDS Information and Awareness Course as part of our volunteers and staff ongoing training and development. The course covers subjects such as HIV pathology, psycho-social issues, confidentiality & sexuality, psychotherapy and HIV/AIDS,

#### **Back To Education Initiative**

In conjunction with The National Learning Network (NLN), Open Heart House was awarded the Back to Education Initiative (B.T.E.I.) during 2009. The aim of B.T.E.I. is to increase the participation of flexible learning options

needs of migrants & minority ethnic communities in Ireland, STIs, Hepatitis C and drugs awareness and addiction. leading to national accreditation. It aims to reach the most marginalised groups and to offer a bridge between community-based and college-based education. Dublin City Vocational Educational Committee (CDVEC)

Open Heart House has developed a unique partnership with N.L.N. and CDVEC which has proven to be of immense developmental value to our members. Our members are presently undertaking pre-development courses and studying towards achieving FETAC certification.

### **National Womens Initiative**

Open Heart House in conjunction with the National Learning Network in 2008 looked at developing a partnership whereby commenced for women. This programme is a pilot programme to run over a period of six months. The programme was supported and funded by the European Social Fund (ESF) through the Human Capital Investment Programme 2007-2013 (HCI-OP); and also the Department of Justice, Equality and Law Reform through the Equality for Women Measure and the National Women's Strategy. Some of the areas that were focused upon within the programme were: Vocational Lifeskills, CV preparation and cover letter, Interview skills, job

applications and work experience. To date the women attending the programme have found it extremely rewarding and useful. We are hoping that this programme will continue into the future as it is meeting a very clear need.

To end the year our Members Christmas Party was yet again a wonderful evening full of seasonal goodwill and festive fun. Each Christmas we provide our members with an evening of food, music and song. Staff and volunteers help to make it a memorable celebration of each other and the year to come. The children of Open Heart House sang Christmas carols with members, volunteers and staff. Santa was back again this year handing out presents to Open Heart House children from his specially designed grotto within the project. We would like to extend our sincere thanks to everyone who contributed to the services provided by Open Heart House throughout the year and I look forward to working with the members to continually re-energise and redevelop our service range in the year to come.

48 volunteers recruited in 2009 leading to a cumulative total of 245 volunteers at year end 2009. We have seen a 24% increase in the number of volunteers recruited since the previous year. 19% of volunteers recruited during 2009 applied from within our membership at Open Heart House. 2009 has been no exception in witnessing the continued passion, and commitment of an expanding team of volunteers who have displayed a sincere desire to be included in the drive to achieve the goals of Open Heart House. The welcome and solidarity extended by each member of the Open Heart House community towards the 48 newly recruited volunteers during this past year reflects powerfully our strong ethos of warmth welcome and acceptance.

Members who have made the commitment to volunteer during 2009 represent 19% of our new volunteers. Many members also contribute time and skills informally right throughout the year and in particular gave of their time generously for key fundraising events this past year including the 'Art Exhibition' held at the Marino institute on 9th May and the bucket collection held on World AIDS Day -1st December. Volunteer involvement during 2009 has shown clearly that each individual endeavour makes a noteworthy difference in our goal to continue in changing attitudes and being co-educators as we strive to end the social stigma and isolation experienced by our members and many others living with HIV and AIDS.

Our records for 2009 reveal a significant increase in the number of enquiries concerning our Volunteer Programme and Student Placement Programme. In fact, by the end of September '09, the number of enquiries had surpassed the previous years' total figure. In our experience, changes in employment have inevitably led some new volunteers to our door while sadly leaving others with the difficult choice of leaving Ireland.

The overall increased levels of recruitment have allowed us to maintain a quality service to our members and to introduce new volunteers offering chiropody, kinesiology and adult literacy tutoring amongst others to our range of services. New support volunteers have also been recruited to work with our membership team providing one-to-one support for members during the week. Our outreach links to Cherry Orchard Hospital and Balseskin Reception Centre alongside the more local city based support networks have been sustained due to the continued commitments of our reliable weekly volunteer outreach team.

Working with tight budget constraints and ensuring building maintenance presents numerous challenges to any organization. During 2009 Open Heart House benefited from assistance in refurbishing key areas within the premises through the eager and welcome involvement of teams taking part in two corDuring 2009 our student placement programme continued to provide experiential learning for students from the Milltown Institute, Liberties College, NCAD, PCI College, Trinity College and the PREDA Foundation

porate volunteer events. Through Business in the Community's Cares initiative, 10 volunteers from Ulster Bank took up the first challenge of a make over of our meditation room. A second challenge was taken up in late 2009 by a team from Barclays Bank who refurbished much of our internal paint work, transforming the internal look of the building. These events provide us with a unique opportunity to share mutual benefits from collaborative links with the business community and also play a key role in facilitating the involvement of staff at a community level.

in the Philippines (people's Recovery, Empowerment and Development Assistance Foundation Inc.). Our annual HIV & AIDS awareness course also continued to provide an opportunity for group learning for many of our new volunteers.

Recognition of the social, economic and political impact of volunteer involvement is at the core of sustaining a motivated and strong volunteer team. Open Heart House was represented at the launch of the third Dublin City Volunteer Week
