
What's at stake?

- Member States committed to ending AIDS by 2030 as part of the Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs).
- The 2016 High-Level Meeting on Ending AIDS has the power to deliver and Fast-Track the response.
- Failure to do so risks a **rebound in the epidemic**.
- Never a greater **opportunity to accelerate** the response:
 - New SDG agenda
 - Innovative solutions
 - Scientific advances
 - Renewed leadership, strong political commitment



Why now?


- If the current level of HIV service is simply maintained, we will see a **rebound in the epidemic**.
- Reaching the **2030 ambition** requires countries to take a Fast-Track approach over the next five years.
- 2016 Political Declaration is an opportunity to establish far-reaching people-centred goals and targets that must be met by 2020 if we are to end the AIDS epidemic by 2030. This means:
 - Fewer than 500 000 people newly infected with HIV
 - Fewer than 500 000 people dying from AIDS-related illnesses
 - Elimination of HIV-related discrimination



What is success from UNAIDS' perspective?

A transformational **Political Declaration** would require that the international community **commits to**:

- 1. Front load and increase investments to at least USD 26 billion to Fast-Track the AIDS response;
- 2. Ambitious quantitative global targets that can be disaggregated by region, population and gender;
- Guarantee access to services for all, in particular in fragile communities and key populations;
- 4. Strengthen people-centred systems for health;
- A strong and efficient global partnership;
- Effective accountability; and
- Recognize and utilize the model of the AIDS response to support results for the SDGs.




What will the meeting look like?

- 8 to 10 June at UN Headquarters in New York.
- Participants include Member State delegations, representatives from the UN, civil society, private sector and other stakeholders.
- Stakeholder engagement in the lead up includes a task force and a civil society hearing to be convened by the PGA on April 6, as well as faceto-face and virtual consultations.
- The meeting will be convened by the President of the General Assembly and co-facilitated by the Permanent Representatives of Switzerland and Zambia to the United Nations.
