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**HIV prevention, care and treatment interventions implemented by UNODC**

**Pakistan** - first ever effort to address HIV among highly vulnerable women and girls.  
More than 1,600 women who use drugs and spouses of male drug users, in 11 cities and 1,400 women inmates in 9 prisons received comprehensive HIV prevention treatment and care services

**Afghanistan** - the project established gender-sensitive HIV services in community and prison settings.  
More than 1,500 women and girls were reached with services. 12,253 needles and syringes and 15,390 condoms distributed. 3,000 women inmates received primary health care.

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**HIV prevention, care and treatment interventions implemented by UNODC**

**Romania** - Technical assistance and direct financial support for scaling-up HIV prevention interventions for IDUs in the community, including among Roma ethnic minorities Development of HIV prevention services for IDUs in prison settings Strengthening the national HIV/AIDS monitoring and evaluation system;  
Advocacy for the sustainability of HIV prevention services for IDUs and inmates.

**Myanmar** - HIV prevention services, including needles and syringe and condom programmes to 4,202 injecting drug users and 6,371 non-injecting drug users.  
Transition among non-injecting drug users to injecting drug use has been reduced in intervention sites to 19.1% in 2010 from 33.2% at baseline.  
Use of a clean needle syringe by IDU at last injection has increased to 85%.  
Use of a condom by IDU at last sex with regular sexual partners has increased to 33%
