SRHR education in Azerbaijan

- Has been ignored since Soviet times
- No tradition of informing young people about their sexual and reproductive health or reproductive rights
- Cultural barriers
- Superstition and misinformation are widespread


Epid situation in Azerbaijan

(9,200 [6,700 - 12,000] - according to UNAIDS)


1519 - People at the stage of

604 - the number of people newly infected with HIV in 2014.



60 positive persons died in year 2014.

Laws

- 1.0.6. **Anonymous testing** without presenting ID/ or personal information;
- 1.0.7. Confidential testing guarantee confidentiality of the test results
- 4.0.6. Free medical treatment in public medical institutions
- 4.0.13. Providing **free medication and services** to PLWH who are Azerbaijani citizens, or non-citizens permanently residing in Azerbaijan and IDPs
- 4.0.14. Palliative care to people at the stage of AIDS
- 4.0.15. **Social protection** according to the legislation on PLWH and HIV affected people

Usage of ART treatment in Azerbaijan - 08.11.2006


7 - ART Regional Treatment Centers

2376 - people living with HIV are involved in antiretroviral therapy currently

605 of who started the treatment in 2014.

The number of people reported to be receiving ART in Azerbaijan increased more than eight-fold since 2004 (ECDC report, 2012).

Barriers for adolescents and young people

Lack of awareness

No accurate, age-appropriate information about HIV/AIDS

Young people - are not aware of their HIV status

Policy barriers

A person under 18 **cannot be tested** on HIV/AIDS without participation of parents or caregivers

No clear statement in the legislation allowing NGOs to participate in organizing testing on HIV/AIDS;

Barriers in accessing HTC

No special provisions on adolescents/juveniles and youth in the National Standards on HIV Testing and Counselling

Lack of capacity and skills to provide T&C to adolescents and young people at risk
