
# **Health Promotion for Young Prisoners (HPYP)**

Funded by the Public Health Programme of the European Commission (2008-2013)

**Starting date:** 01.04.2010 **Ending date:** 31.03.2013





#### Background

Health problems of prisoners are widespread and exacerbated by rising prison populations. Young prisoners have needs distinct from other prisoners and are more disadvantaged than their counterparts in the community showing negative impacts on their health. There is a clear need for prisons to respond with health promotion interventions to address health inequalities endorsing the World Health Organization's principle that time spent in custody should aid disease prevention and promote health.

### The project

The general objective of the HPYP project is to develop and improve health promotion for young vulnerable people in the prison setting. It specifically aims at the subsequent implementation of a health promotion toolkit for young prisoners widely across European Member States. The toolkit will address health related factors regarding infectious diseases, sexual health, mental health as well as the prevention and treatment of drug use. The target group includes young people (up to 24 years old) in pre- and sentenced prisons, including particular vulnerable groups like women, migrants and ethnic minorities and problem drug users.

## Methodology

Using a participatory approach, the development of the toolkit on health promotion will be based on the views and needs of vulnerable young people in prison as well as on those of prison staff and representatives from NGOs as possible deliverers of health promotion in the prison setting. Methods include:

- extensive literature reviews and document analyses;
- needs assessments including young prisoners, prison staff as well as other providers of health promotion by means of anonymous questionnaires;
- focus groups with young people in the prison setting further exploring questions arising from the needs assessment:
- qualitative interviews with prison staff and members of NGOs further exploring their role and needs in providing health promotion.

The toolkit will be piloted in Bulgaria, the Czech Republic, Estonia, Latvia and Romania, further developed and disseminated to a broad range of professionals and organisations in the EU Member States working with young vulnerable people in prison.
